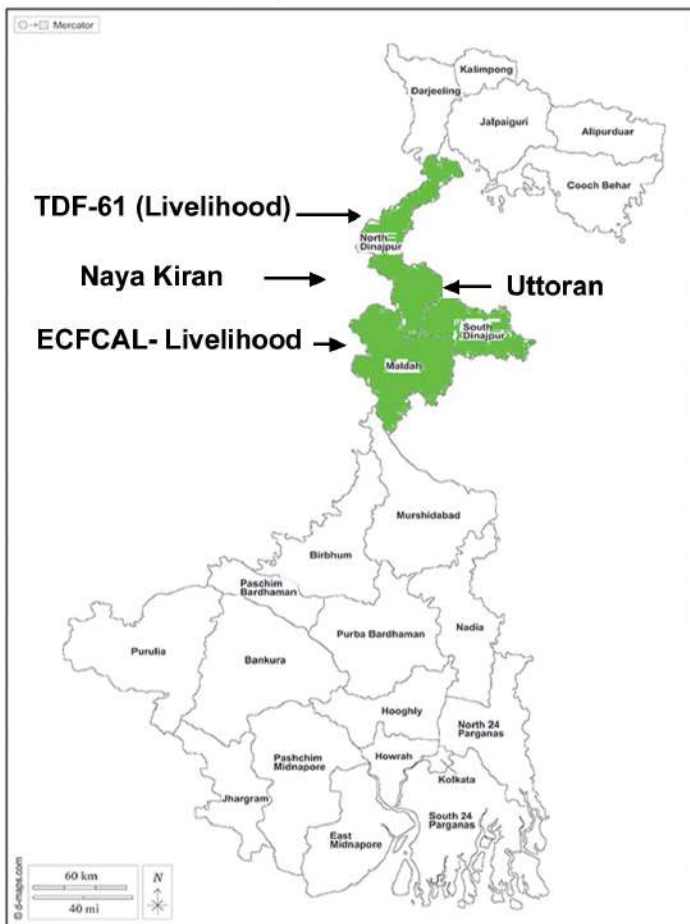

A Brief History of SWI

Social Welfare Institute is a charitable and Social Service Society of the Diocese of Raiganj and its area of operation include Malda, Uttar Dinajpur and Dakshin Dinajpur districts of West Bengal. The Institute was established with the aim of bringing about a society where love, peace and equality are lived and experienced by all.

During the Indo – Pak war in 1971, nearly 2 million refugees from Bangladesh landed up in North Bengal for asylum; government machineries were unable to meet the needs of the refugees. Due to heavy influx of refugees, basic needs such as food, shelter and medical care collapsed. People of North Bengal faced innumerable problems. At once, then diocese of Dumka, feeling the dire needs of the people rushed for help; as a result, Social Welfare Institute came into existence and it is presently in Raiganj diocese.

To begin with, it focused its attention on the welfare of the refugees, then after the war, seeing the poverty stricken lives of the poorest and tribal in the area, it continued its services in order to uplift the downtrodden especially the scheduled castes and scheduled tribes. Within two years (1973), Social Welfare Institute was registered under the Societies' Registration Act XXVI of 1961. From then on, it has been carrying out various welfare programmes for the weaker sections of society by the help of several donor agencies.

Livelihood project - TDF - 61

The grant assistance is from NABARD out of Tribal Development Fund (TDF-61) for implementation of Tribal Development project at Nizampur II GP of Goalpokher II block, Uttar Dinajpur district of West Bengal.

The primary purpose of animal husbandry projects for Scheduled Tribes is to enhance the livelihood and income generation of these communities through livestock farming, particularly pig and goat rearing. This is achieved by providing access to quality livestock, capacity building, and infrastructure development.

Through this project the essential infrastructure, such as pig/goat shed and community cattle quarantine centre were developed. The 150 beneficiaries are provided animal piglets /goats, shed for cattle and the animal husbandry training. The beneficiaries are equipped with the necessary skills for managing livestock and marketing of animal products.



Achievements.....

150 women received training on Animal husbandry (pig & goat rearing). The women have opportunities to be empowering their economic status. By the knowledge and skills they have received to manage livestock, so, they can increase income, access resources, and improve their status within their communities.

50 goats shed or goat house made. The women didn't have the any idea of scientific goat shed. Through this goat house they can provide shelter and protection from the elements, enhancing their overall well-being and productivity. The shed also provides a controlled environment, aiding in disease prevention and facilitating better management practices.



Achievements.....

100 pig sheds have made. This shed is well-designed, management of pigs, including feeding, watering and cleaning.

1 quarantine centre made for animals. It is for protecting animal health, preventing the spread of diseases for isolating newly imported animals.

50 women beneficiaries received 6 each goats for rearing. It is essential for a sustainable and profitable for small and marginal farmers.

100 women beneficiaries received 4 each piglets for rearing. It is provides as supplementary income for rural people.

150 women received training on kitchen garden. A kitchen garden offers numerous benefits, including providing access to fresh & organic vegetable.

1 Village planning committee formed in the project area. This committee primarily focuses on planning and monitoring of the project and promoting villagers participation in project activities animal rearing programme.

1 Project level Tribal Development committee formed. It focuses on monitoring and implementing, progress of the project and ensuring timely project completion, as well as assisting with project formulation, implementation, and review.

Uttoran- III

The Uttoran-III project is to achieve sustainable livelihoods in 25 villages with small and marginal, agriculture labour and women in Rampur and Shitgram Panchayats of Raiganj block of Uttar Dinajpur district. The aim is to increase income and employment among landless people, subsistence farmers, rural entrepreneurs. It will promote the climate adoptive agriculture practices, commercialization of smallholder farm production, commercial rural businesses and off-farm income-generating activities through the supply chain approach.

Major achievements

100 farmers received high breed mastered seedfor having good relationships with government offices. It provide access to valuable information, guidance, and support.

80 people received lokhi bhandar, 105 people have SSY, Awareness meetings provide individuals with the necessary information about various government schemes, programs, This knowledge empowers them to apply for and utilize these schemes effectively, ensuring that they receive the support they need.

5 people accessed krishak bandhu death benefits from ADA department (Rs. 2,00,000/-) The Krishak Bandhu Scheme of West Bengal government, provides financial assistance to farmers for agricultural activities and social security for their families. It offers 5,000 per acre per year as income support and a death benefit of 2,00,000. It is open to small and marginal farmers with up to 2 acres of land.

1525 trees were planted in Rampur and Shitgramme Gram Panchayat. People were motivated to plant fruit (mangos, jackfruit, black berry and guava plant) plants because it helps echo system as well as it provides seasonal fruits to the people



Achievements.....

75 people are well prepared in organic farming. They prepare Fruit Fermented Juice (FFJ) as vitamin for plant and Fish Amino Acid as organic pesticide and they already using it. Fermented fruit juice (FFJ) can be used as a foliar spray, providing quick access to nutrients, and as a seed treatment.

4 women sell their vegetable in the weekly market (Maharaja Hat). These women cultivate vegetable in their small land with organic manure and pesticide.

224 women increased their income through goat rearing. They used customary practice to raising and breeding domestic goats. They sell the product in the rural hat.

74 girls are trained in tailoring in Adiar training centre. 23 women are earning through tailoring particularly in the area with a demand.

1 woman started poultry farming in their abundant land. Poultry farming positively it can provide a significant source of protein and income and it is more economical than other farming methods.

Case story – good source of income

Shyamal Sing of Lohagara village of Rampur Gram Panchayat have intercropped maize and lafa sak in 0.50 acres of land in October 2024. He first planted maize and then, he sowed lafa sak in the same land. After ten day maize started germinating and then lafa sak. After 20 day onwards, he started plucking the fafa sak and selling gradually. Within 45 days he earned Rs. 4500/- from lafa sak. Since he had cultivated lafa sak with maize the land had no weed and moisture was maintained. He bought fertilizer and pesticides with the sold money of lafa sak. And the maize stamp became strong.



Empowered Communities foster Climate Adaptive Agriculture and Livelihoods- Phase II

The ECFCAL Phase 2 project, launched in June 2024, has made commendable progress in improving livelihoods and fostering resilience within the target communities. The project aims to ensure that by 2026, 70% of Farmer Collectives (FCs), Farmer Producer Companies (FPCs), and Self-Help Groups (SHGs) in three Gram Panchayats (Aktoil, Mangalpura and Habibpur) of Habibpur block, Maldah district, actively participate in and support village-level governance. To achieve this, several foundational activities have been initiated, focusing on capacity building, fostering financial, and governance. Training sessions have empowered CBOs with the knowledge to prepare micro-plans for identifying community needs and potential gaps, enabling them to advocate for their priorities effectively.



Achievements.....

55 people have been assisted in linking their mobile numbers with Aadhaar, enabling better access to services and security.

7 and 43 farmers cultivated moong beans and lentils for first time after harvesting of paddy.

87 families cultivate different vegetable in small place or wasted land (kitchen garden) with organic manure. The families save the money as well as they consume fresh and organic vegetable.

13 farmers accessed 6,000 through PM Kisan scheme. PM-KISAN is a government scheme offering financial support to small and marginal farmers across India. Under this initiative, eligible farmers receive 6000 in bank accounts.



ECFCAL Achievements.....

33 women received 20 each chicks to start chicken farming from Block Live-stock Development Office, Habibpur block.

11 farmers were provided black plastic pipes for irrigation. It used for irrigation because it offers several benefits, particularly in terms of durability and water quality.

34 fish farmers received training on benefits of Fishery cards and it's essential for accessing training and grants of central Government.

22 new Kisan Mandi cards have been issued, and 18 cards have been renewed. Kisan Mandi, is a platform, both physical and virtual, that facilitates the direct purchase and sale of agricultural produce between farmers and consumers or buyers. |

42 women have received tailoring training to improve their quality of life and livelihood. Out of these 10 women have bought sewing machines to enable them to earn more.



A success story from Haridevpur

For years, farmers in Habibpur relied on the Swarna paddy, a traditional crop that required four months to mature and yielded average production. During this long cultivation period they migrate to other state for income. Through ECFCAL Phase 2 project, however, introduced them with advanced cultivation techniques and short-duration paddy BB 11. Uttam Murmu and Shyamal Mandal agreed to cultivate BB 11 paddy cultivation. They were provided with BB-II paddy seeds. With guidance of ECFCAL project, they planted the new variety on their respective lands. The results were remarkable. The BB-II variety not only matured faster but also delivered a significantly higher yielding paddy.



Naya Kiran

Education plays a pivotal roll in the overall development of an individual. During covid 2019 children could not attend regular classes or dropped outs are given preference in the tuition centre. The “Naya Kiran” project aims to enrol 150 school dropout children in tuition centres and mainstream them in formal education system. 12 tuition centres are in Rosakhowa and Rampur of Uttar Dinajpur district. This tuition centres play a great roll to teach and prepare the children for enrolment in the Government schools, so that they can cope with formal education according to the age and class. Beside this we also create awareness on education to parents to mainstream the drop out children into the formal education system.



Achievement.....

12 Tuition centre is running in Uttar Dinajpur district.

252 children are studding in 12 tuition centres. These children are from most needy and

92 drop out children enrolled in the Government school.

72 parents are aware on child education.

12 teachers are trained on Child Rights and child protection

12 child labours were enrolled in the tuition centre for study.

32 women/ girls received tailoring training for support their family



Observations of Important days

World environment Day

Social Welfare Institute observed World Environment Day at Rampur village of Rampur Gram Panchayat of Raiganj block, Uttar Dinajpur district. On the occasion tree plantation programme was organized with villagers to promote tree plantation. Nearly 25 people planted mango plant.



World Aids Day

Social Welfare Institute observed World AIDS day on 1st December 2024 in collaboration with Government health department and the other like minded NGO. There was a rally on the occasion from Raiganj railway station to SWI office campus. The motive of rally was to create awareness on prevention of HIV/AIDS as well as the treatment of it.



15th August 2024 Independence Day

We celebrate 15th August Independence Day of India. On this day children came to the tuition centers with great enthusiasm. The celebration started with a rally. After the rally the children and teacher has the flag hosting ceremony with National Anthem. Then the children have performed the cultural programme. Followed by cultural programme.



Childrens' Day: 14th November 2024 is celebrated children's day Rasakhowa Primary Sch. With children of 8 tuition centres. The occasion started at 10.30 am with welcome song by the children of Kurkha tuition followed welcome dance by the children of Nazirpur Tuition centre and group dance by children of Jamdanga tuition centre. Nusrat Begam from Daluakhri centre gave speech on Jawaharlal Nehru the first Prime minister of India. Rajendra Kr. Bhoumik Head Master of Rasakhowa Abaitanik Primary Sch. spoke about the history of the Children's Day .



Skill Development training at Adiar

SWI initiated self supported tailoring (sewing) training at Adiar village of Rampur Gram Panchayat of Raiganj block of Uttar Dinajpur. This year total 70 girls are trained in cutting and sewing and among these 14 girls have bought sewing machines and started earning for themselves. This will alleviate poverty and support their family needs without being dependent of husband and parents.



World TB day: "We are together in this effort to end TB, the oldest airborne pandemic that continues to threaten global health and kills more people than any other infectious disease. There was a rally from SWI campus to Raiganj railway station with the theme "Yes! We Can End TB: Commit, Invest and Deliver." The occasion was coordinated by the District TB control unit, SWI and all the NGO partners observed TB day on 25th March 2025.



Blood Donation camp

"Donating blood is the most valuable gift we can give". Believing the phrase SWI organized a blood donation camp on 25th December 2024 on the occasion of birth anniversary of Lord Jesus Christ. The purpose to organize a blood donation camp is to motivate people to donate blood, So, that increase blood availability. It is to promote and select a suitable donor whose blood will be safe to the recipient. The decision to donate blood can save a life or even several if the blood is separated into its components



Children Immunization Programme - Self supported



Vaccines reduce risks of getting a disease by working with your body's natural defenses to build protection. When a child gets vaccine, the immune system responds. So, Social Welfare Institute operates a self supported immunization centre since 2005. Subsequently it has been rendering services to the people. The camp functions for three days in a week (Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday). Availability and regularity of vaccination has been good service to the people.
